MEMORIALS TO SOLDIERS.

LATE LIEUT. K. J. STRACK.

At the Methodist Church last night a At the Methodist Church last night a memorial number board was unveiled to the memory of Lieut. Karl Justus Strack. There was a very large congregation, and the Rev. A. Liversedge, who was assisted by Lieut. G. Strack, occupied the pulpit. The whole of the hymns, as well as the anthem, "Lead Kindly Light" (soloist Miss Champion) and the solo by Mr. W. Hutchens "Nearer My God to Thee," were all chosen as being special favorites of Lieut. K. J. Strack. Mrs W. Hutchens officiated at the organ, and played ens officiated at the organ and played as a voluntary, "Meditation."

The Rev. A. Liversedge, remarking on the late Lieut. Strack, said: "It is evident that his life was one of singu-

lar charm. He came of a family which had been naturalised for over 100 years, and while a shadow rested on all such families, he and his had proved themselves to be loyal subjects of the realm. He was a patriot of patriots. Born in New Zealand, he was a scholar of this (Methodist) Sunday School. Fond of music, in his love for song he revealed his soul. "My little hymn-book," he wrote in one of his letters home, "accompanies me in all my journeys.

Won't it be grand if it goes back to
Hawera with me." While away on the Hawera with me." While away on the Continent, he had strolled into a Catholic Cathedral and had been given permission to play on the organ some of the tunes he loved. Coming back that way some time later he again sought out that church, only to find that it had been blown to pieces. The organ however, was still intact, and he repeated his previous performance. He was talented having gained his commission, being seventh on the list. He was possessed of strength and courage, as his life on the battlefield had shown. As he lived, so he died. His end came gloriously, revealing the true heart of the man. During an engagement, his company had reached their final objective, but on arriving there considered it a bad place for his men to dig in. Ever mindful of his "boys," he hopped out again, chose a spot, and called out to a brother officer, "Right-oh! You to a brother officer, "Right oh! You take there, I'll take here. It's better for our fellows." Almost immediately, ere he could reach his men, a flying piece of shell caught him. To-night we commemorate his life and others connected with this church who have given up their lives. The memorial hynn-board had been the gift by Miss Lily Hulbert, of Motueka, who however, was unfortunately not able to be pre-

sent at the service.

Miss Strack then unveiled the board, Miss Strack then unveiled the board, the congregation standing.

The board, which was designed and built by Mr C. Johnson, is of polished mangaio wood, mounted with two silver plates, the upper one surmounted with a design of Mt. Egmont, and bearing the inscription: 'To the glory of God, and in loving remembrance of Lieut and in loving remembrance of Lieut.
Karl Justus Strack; killed in action
somewhere in France, 4th October,
1917.—Lily Hulbert." The bottom plate was inscribed with a verse of the hymn "Day is Dying in the West." In connection with the design on the upper plate, the Rev. A. Liversedge mentioned that it was there because of the fact that it was the last bit of New Zealand seen as the 7th Reinforcements left these shores.
